Quw'utsun Sta'lo' Skweyul Cowichan River Day


Saturday, September 25, 10:00AM to 2:00PM

Gather at 222 Cowichan Way, at the site of the old VIU near Superstore in Duncan. From there, take a short walk to the river site, located on Cowichan Tribes' land.



The Quw'utsun River has been the heartbeat of the Cowichan People since time immemorial and is a provincially and nationally designated heritage river.

Please bring your own drinking water — there are limited facilities on site. People with mobility issues — please let the organizers know about your mobility needs so that you can be directed to parking that has been reserved for you closer to the event



The Federal Government of Canada has passed legislation to formally designate September 30th of each year as an annual federal statutory holiday, called the **National Day of Truth and Reconciliation**.

Traditionally September 30th of each year has been commemorated as Orange Shirt Day. National Day of Truth and Reconciliation now provides all Canadians an opportunity to recognize and commemorate the history and ongoing trauma caused by residential schools and to honour those who were lost and the survivors, families and communities who continue to grieve. This may present itself as a day of quiet reflection or participation in a community event.

Cowichan Tribes will be adhering to this federally designated annual statutory day and will allow employees to observe and participate in this important day starting **September 30, 2021**.
