

To engage the Cowichan community by collecting their knowledge and questions about the watershed.


objectives

Deep Listening & Appreciative Inquiry





What is Deep Listening?

Attempts to use ways of asking questions and envisioning the future in order to foster positive relationships and build on the present potential of a given person, organization or situation.

1. EYE CONTACT

Use the 80/20 rule - spend 80% of your time making eye contact, and 20% looking around.





2. PRESENCE

Keep your mind quiet, and focus your whole presence on listening to your conversation partner to better absorb what they are saying so they feel heard and appreciated.

3. NONVERBAL FEEDBACK

To let the speaker know you are listening, give the occasional nod, smile, or hand gesture.





4. CONNECTION

Create a safe and welcoming space for the speaker to open up.

The identification of organizational processes that work well.

The implementation of the proposed design.




Community Watershed Mapping






