Re: Provincial Support Urgently Needed to Replace the Cowichan River Weir

Dear Ministers:

As co-chairs of the Cowichan Watershed Board¹, we are writing to request a meeting with you at your earliest convenience regarding the urgent need to replace the Cowichan River weir.

On Sept. 13 the Cowichan River was placed on "life support", dependent on mechanical pumps to maintain river flows of 4.5 cubic meters/second - the minimum necessary for fish health. To do so, Lake Cowichan will be drawn down to its lowest level in geological time resulting in significant impacts to sensitive littoral lake habitats. If significant rain does not fall within 49 days, the provincial license will require Catalyst to stop its pumps, and the Cowichan River flows will drop precipitously, stranding salmon in the river.

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¹ The Cowichan Watershed Board is a local governance model created in 2010 to provide leadership for sustainable water management in the Cowichan/Koksilah watersheds, ancestral home of the Quw'utsun First Nation. The CWB is co-chaired by Cowichan Tribes and the Cowichan Valley Regional District and represents a unique partnership between First Nations and local government. Through this model, Cowichan Tribes and the CVRD work together to advance whole-of-watershed health, demonstrating a commitment to moving down the path of reconciliation.

Earlier this summer, the Cowichan River experienced a significant fish kill, with an estimated tens of thousands of salmon and trout juveniles and adults perishing. Fisheries and Oceans Canada has determined that the cause was likely the cumulative stress associated with high temperatures and low water flows. Flows on that day were also 4.5 cubic meters per second. On September 11th, Catalyst mill's weir manager reported that the discharge from the lake had fallen to the lowest level recorded in the past 65 years.

This is a cross-ministry situation, with relevance to each of your Ministries. Building a higher weir at Lake Cowichan is essential for climate change adaptation, wild salmon survival, Indigenous food sovereignty, economic security, recreation, culture, and tourism. A new governance framework for the weir will also demonstrate respect for Cowichan Tribes legal rights and advance reconciliation.

The Cowichan River has BC and Canadian Heritage status and is deserving of all the support we can offer. The salmon populations it sustains have provided physical, cultural, and spiritual sustenance for the Quw'utsun people for millennia. As local partners we have made strong progress to advance this project, including strengthening local governance and partnerships, completing significant and award-winning technical and engineering designs and studies, and securing conditional federal infrastructure funding which is contingent on matching funds.

We acknowledge the early funding the Province has provided for this project through the BC Salmon Restoration and Innovation Fund and the efforts of WLRS and MoF staff. However, safeguarding the future viability of the Cowichan River wild salmon ecosystem will only succeed with strong provincial partnerships and resources. Due to the urgency of this situation and the ready opportunity to address it, we request meetings, either jointly or individually, with each of you at your earliest convenience to discuss the necessary provincial support to move this project forward.

We are truly in crisis mode and the situation has attracted significant national and international media. Every year that we delay compounds the ecological, cultural, and economic costs.

We look forward to meeting with you.
